SHANKS SPENT MORE THAN THREE DECADES SERVING PUTNAM STUDENTS

PUTNAM COUNTY – After watching his mother and father dedicate their careers to educating students in Putnam County, becoming a educator was a natural choice for Wayne Shanks. Thirty-six years after his own teaching career began in Putnam County, Shanks is retiring to spend more time with his second

passion his family.

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"What attracted me to this profession were my father and mother, Water Warren and Wanda Shanks worked for the Putnam County Board of Education," Shanks said. "Dad was a mathematics teacher and later elected PC Superintendent of Schools (1972-1984). Mother worked in a school support role as a substitute teacher, teacher assistant and as a bookkeeper at CHS.

After high school graduation, Shanks left Putnam County to continue his education earning an associate of science degree from Otlow State Junior College and then a bachelor of sciences, degree from Middle Tennessee State University with certifications in health sciences, safety, and recreation.

In 1976, Shanks came home to Putnam County to begin his teaching. For 17 years, he was a teacher and coach at Upperman High School.

"As a child, I aspired to play professional baseball," Shanks said. "I have always enjoyed the competition of many sports. As a coach, I tried to promote and instill into my players good work ethic, the importance of preparation and organizational skills, teamwork, setting goals. There were the things that were of great benefit to me during my playing days."

Shanks led Upperman teams to success. In 1982, the baseball team was runner up for the championship, and in 1991 and 1993, the team was named state champion. In 1994, he was awarded the Distinguished Service Recognition Award from the TSSAA. In 1995, he was inducted into the Tennessee Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame with a record of 409 wins and 104 loses.

Shanks also led the UHS women's baseball team on its first ever trip to the state tournament.

Following his initial work at UHS, Shanks spent two years as a system-wide supervisor. Then, he put his master's degree with a professional license in administration and supervision with endorsements in Pre-K through 12th grade from Tennessee Tech to use by spending 17 years as principal at two different county high schools.

From 1995 to 2000, Shanks returned to UHS as principal where he helped the school develop an honors level curriculum for students interested in a more rigorous program of studies.

"I enjoy observing teachers and students genuinely engaged in passionate teaching and learning," Shanks said. "I feel a lot of excitement when students, meet and then exceed their potential. This occurs when we provide students with a rigorous, relevant and personal education."

In 2000, Shanks was named building principal at Cookeville High School where he has served for 12 years.

"As a building administrator, I enjoyed helping and working personally with administrators, faculty, staff, students and parents to create a school culture and climate based on high expectations for all," Shanks said.

Shanks saw CHS through many new programs, including the application to become an International Baccalaureate Diploma school in 2001.

"In 2003, CHS received authorization to provide the IB Diploma Programme, which is designed as an academically challenging and balanced programme of education with final examinations that prepares students for success at university and life beyond," Shanks said. "The programme is normally taught over two years and has gained recognition and respect from the world's leading universities."

At the time, CHS was only the fourth high school and the only non-metropolitan school in the state to offer the IBO program.

Under Shanks' supervision, CHS has also expanded advanced placement options for students and implemented a single lunch period for all students.

"The schedule has contributed more to a positive school climate than any other single factor," Shanks said. "Lunchtime is rarely considered a scheduling or instructional component. All students have an equal opportunity to take advantage of academic, counseling, club needs as well as other obligations that students rarely have time to do during the school day."

In 2008, CHS also created a freshman transition model to help entering ninth grade successfully meet goals and objectives.

Wayne's wife of 38 years, Kathy (Sutton) Shanks, is also a retired teacher. Kathy taught for 33 years, working at Cookeville Junior High and Cookeville High School.

The couple has three children. Their oldest daughter, Tiffany, is a 2001 Abilene Christian graduate and is married to Matt Davidson. They have two sons, Easton age 4 and Graham Warren age 2, and one daughter Baylor Kate, age 8 months. Tiffany and Matt reside in Cookeville. Their youngest daughter Andrea is a 2005 UT graduate and is married to Drew Langley. Andrea and Drew reside in Knoxville. Wes Shanks is the couple's youngest child. He is a 2009 UT graduate and is married to Alex Mullican. They live in Cookeville and are expecting their first child in December.

"When Kathy and I are not playing with our grandchildren we enjoy gardening in our yard," Wayne said. "Occasionally, we will take the top off the Jeep and enjoy the countryside. We also spend time on the family farm in Buffalo Valley where there is always something to do. Watching baseball and golf are a favorite. I also enjoy playing golf when I get the opportunity. Also, we have recently enjoyed some traveling and hope to do more."

At a recent reception held in Wayne's honor, he was presented with a painting by CHS art teacher Mitch White. The painting depicts the barn on the Shanks family farm in Buffalo Valley, a reminder of Shanks' roots and service in Putnam County.
